Jesus Christ was born a King, lived a King, died a King, rose again a King, reigns inside believers as King, and is physically returning soon to reign forever as King (Ps. 2)! Another great earthquake occurs and a very _____ angel, the angel of the Lord, gloriously appears and rolls back the stone - v. 2-4; 27:54; Ex. 3:2-4; Jud. 13:20-22; Dan. 10:6; Rev. 1:13-16. The watch (keepers) shake...as dead men (v. 11; 27:65) = These women are invited to come and see the empty tomb and then to _____ go and tell the others which they do with mixed emotions (fear and great joy) – v. 5-8; Jn. 20:1-10; 2 Tim. 1:7. Mary Magdalene and the women have several _____ encounters with the risen King – v. 10; Jn. 20:11-18. Touch me not (Jn. 20:17; Mk. 16:9) = They came and held him by the feet (v. 9; Heb. 8:1-6; 9:7-14, 23-26) = 2. Religion is Powerless and Empty vs. The Resurrection – v. 11-15 **Some** of the Roman soldiers (the watch) flee the empty tomb to Israel's leaders with news of all they had - v. 11; Acts 12:18-19. Israel's leaders decide together to pay off the soldiers and governor Pilate (if necessary) and instruct them how to _____ and cover everything up – v. 12-15; Acts 6:7. 3. The King's Powerful Plan – v. 16-20

The eleven disciples gather to Jesus in Galilee with mixed emotions (some) – v. 16-17;

Jn. 14:1-5, 20:24-29; Is. 26:3.
