We are at the climax of the story of Jonah. Jonah is told by God to go and preach a simple message of judgment to the lost and wicked Assyrian capital city. Jonah disobeys the Lord, and God takes him out of the game, using that disobedience for His glory. Jonah _____ from the belly of hell and God repents putting Jonah back into action giving a second chance to go and preach. The people of Ninevah believe God and repent, and God repents of the evil he intended (v. 10). We come to another controversy through the events of this story. Does God change His mind and how does that work? Are we robots who just do God's bidding?
