Park Point University has developed their "Pronouns and Inclusive Language Guide." According to the schools' Office of Equity and Inclusion, students have been notified that "any individual who has been informed of another person's gender identity, pronouns, or chosen name is expected to respect that individual" and that "misgendering, continued misuse of an individual's pronouns, or using an individual's deadname after being informed of a chosen name could result in a violation of the Policy on Discrimination and Harassment for gender-based discrimination." The university further stated, "While the University recognizes the aspect of intent versus impact, we must recognize that regardless of the intent, if an individual is impacted in a harmful way, action could be taken if a complaint is filed."
