Read Acts 9:19-31

1. From the text itself, what did you hear/learn that you did not know before this weekend?

- 2. Saul's last words before his conversion were, "Who are you Lord?" Saul's first words after his conversion were, "Jesus is the Son of God?" Explain the significance of such a change in his worldview.
- 6. In the message, Pastor Brian said, "God never saved us to put us on a deserted island. Yet, so many believers live this way and then wonder why there is no growth or why they feel like an outsider." What does this mean, and what steps can you take to prevent this from happening in your church life?
