
- The first half of Solomon's reign is majestic beyond comparison ... His rule is the admiration of other nations ... His palace and the Lord's Temple are priceless jewels who splendor has never been see ... God's Kingdom is thriving, and its influence is advancing ... Little by little, though, areas of sin begin to take hold in Solomon's life ... And one sin after another leads him away from the Lord 1Kg11:9-13 ... In judgment, God tells Solomon the kingdom will be divided 10 tribes will divide from 2 tribes
- To carry out this judgment, God sends a message to Jeroboam, a servant of Solomon, and tells him what's about to happen the kingdom will divide, and 10 tribes will be given to him to rule over ... Upon hearing this, Solomon tries to kill Jeroboam, but he escapes ... After Solomon's death, his son, Rehoboam, seeks to take over the throne ... And Jeroboam comes out of hiding, and leads a revolt against Rehoboam ... Before civil war begins, God sends a prophet with a warning do not march against one another, because this has happened by My doing
- Northern Kingdom Israel: 19 kings; no connection to David's dynasty, small dynasties span from 931-722 BC ...
 There are no good kings in Israel, each is compared to Jeroboam 15:26,34 ... Southern Kingdom Judah: 20 kings; all continue as David's dynasty, spanning from 931-587 BC ... There are 4 good kings, 4 somewhat good kings; each is compared to David 15:3,11
- Jeroboam sets up two places of worship for Israel Bethel and Dan, a golden calf in each place 12:28 ... Right
 away, Jeroboam leads Israel to worship a God of convenance, made according to man's image and standard ...
 Additionally, he sets up foreign gods throughout the land and establishes his own priests and days of worship
 - ⊙ God pronounces judgment upon both places 13:2, 2Kg23:15-16 (King Josiah) ... Is God offering grace and mercy in hope Israel repents before judgment falls upon them? ... God also warns that captivity will come upon Israel 2Kg17:6 (Assyrian empire) ... This captivity occurs in 722 BC 17:7-8, 12-14 ... Foreigners from other nations are brought in to resettle the land, as well as some previously deported ... The mixed population become known as Samaritans
- The kingdom of Judah continues on after Israel is exiled to Assyria, but their obedience to God hangs on a thread ... Hezekiah strives to bring about reform ... He does well until his pride causes him to act foolishly ... After he dies, his son, Manasseh, ascends to the throne, and he makes it his mission to undo every reform his father set in place 2Kg21:3-6 ... As He did for Israel, God sends prophets to Judah and warns them that captivity is coming ... A brief time of hope is given when Josiah finally becomes king as God promised ... He makes it his mission to undo every evil practice his grandfather and father set in place ... Yet, no amount of goodness and reform can keep God from bringing His judgement
 - During Josiah's reign, Assyria is defeated by Babylon ... In 606, Babylon begins to attack Judah and carry away captives 2Kg24:2-3 ... 606 the captives include the Prophet Daniel ... 597 the captives include the Prophet Ezekiel ... 587 the captives include the Prophet Jeremiah ... All in Jerusalem is destroyed
- Like the Fall, it appears as if God's Kingdom has been defeated by all that is evil ... God's people are exiled to a
 foreign land ... God's place lies in ruin ... God's blessing has been replaced with His judgment
 - The partial kingdom was never meant to be the fulfillment ... It always stood as a type an imperfect model of what was to come ... As long as the powers of sin holds humanity in bondage, God's Kingdom remains imperfect and partial ... Only a Perfect King can truly release His people from bondage, and by doing so, will He cause His Kingdom to be truly known and realized as a Kingdom that has come and is coming

1 and 2 Chronicles, Ezra Chronicles is written after people return from Babylonian Exile, and recounts the Kings of Judah, starting with David. The events in Chronicles are a retelling of the events in 2 Samuel and Kings.

Ezra, Ezra Ezra 1-4 First return of Exiles back to Judah under Zerubbabel 538 – 457 BC Ezra 7-10 Second return of Exiles back to Judah under Ezra

Esther, *Unknown* Events of Esther occur in Persia, before Ezra is allowed to return to Judah

Nehemiah, *Nehemiah* Nehemiah overlaps with Ezra 7-10

- Goes to Corinth during 3rd missionary journey

1st Letter - 1 Corinthians 5:9

2nd Letter – 1 Corinthians 5:11 (what we know as **1 Corinthians**)

- Returns to Corinth, refers to it as a 'painful visit' - 2 Corinthians 2:1

3rd Letter – 2 Corinthians 2:1-4

4th Letter (what we know as 2 Corinthians)

- Future return to Corinth is expressed - 2 Corinthians 13:1
