What does God have in store for us in 1995?

This is the kind of question that inevitably accompanies the arrival of a new year. It is a question we like to ask, because the new year suggests to us a future bright with possibilities, a future redolent with the sweet scent of hope

As a church, we have witnessed God's powerful presence among us. We came to the banks of the Jordan River, wondering if we could go


