## When life doesn't make sense...

1. Be honest with God. (Habakkuk 1:12-13)

**2.** <u>Trust</u> that God is working out His plan. (Habakkuk 1:12, 2:3; Psalm 33:10-11; Job 42:2; Isaiah 55:8-9)

## 3. Wait on God's timing. (Habakkuk 2:1-3; Psalm 37:7)

**4. Live by** <u>faith</u>—be faithful. (Habakkuk 2:4; Proverbs 3:5-6; Psalm 37:1-3; 1 Peter 4:19)

"Modern society seems even more complex and confusing than Habakkuk's. In this modern age God is faithful to his people. He remains the Lord of history, working to bring all people to him in faith and obedience. His working in history may appear as mysterious and inconsistent to us as it did to Habakkuk. The answer is not in rejecting God or in disconnecting him from our history. The answer is in waiting for his timing to bring about his purposes. Such waiting calls for faithfulness in having faith."
