A. What does El Shaddai mean?

- "El" is the singular form of Elohim which refers to God as the all-powerful Creator God.
- "Shaddai" comes from the root word Shad which literally means "breast."
- "Shad" is used to signify the supply of nourishment needed to supply life.
- When "El" is linked with "Shaddai," it would signify the One who nourishes and supplies.

Answer: El Shaddai is God <u>all-powerful</u> and God <u>all-sufficient</u>.

"Thus, two divine qualities are implied in the name El Shaddai. God is both the strong One who is able to deliver, and the tender One who nourishes and satisfies...Some feel that the term 'All-sufficient' would be a better translation."

B. Why does God reveal Himself to Abram as El Shaddai?

- Genesis 12:1-2, God gives Abram a promise.
- Genesis 15:1-4, Abram doubts God's promise.
- Genesis 16:1-4, Abram and Sarai try to help God with His promise.
- Genesis 17:1-4, God reveals Himself to Abram as El Shaddai.

Answer: God is communicating to Abram that because He is El Shaddai, He can and will <u>fulfill His promise</u>.

Answer:

1. Because He can and will fulfill His promises—nothing is too hard for Him.
