

## **Psalm 51: David Repents**

King David was known as a man after God's heart. David was an amazing king, chosen and led by God. But he was a human, like us, and humans sometimes do wrong things. David made mistakes and made choices that tarnished his heart with sin. One day he did something really wrong—he took the wife of a man named Uriah. To cover up his sin, David sent Uriah into battle to be killed. King David thought no one knew about his sin, but God knew.

God did not want David's heart to remain full of sin, so God sent a prophet named Nathan to help David repent. Nathan didn't just charge in with his finger pointed, shouting, "You're a sinner and you know it!" Instead, Nathan pointed out David's sin in a careful, tactful way, by telling a story.

He and his children played with the sheep. He took good care of the sheep, fed it nutritious food, and treated it like one of his children." Nathan continued, "One day a traveler visited the rich man. For dinner, the rich man wanted to serve lamb, but instead of serving one of his own sheep from his huge flock, the rich man took the poor man's only lamb. Nathan asked King David, "What should be done to the rich man?"

In fury, King David pounded his fist on the table. "That man should be severely punished. He is a horrible human being."

The prophet pointed at King David and said, "You are just like the rich man. You have so much, but you took something that did not belong to you."

Most of us would probably be angry with Nathan, but David took responsibility and said, "I have sinned." Even though David had done many good things, this sin stained his life. David's prayer of repentance is recorded in Psalm 51.

God forgave David's horrible sin and restored him. Although David suffered consequences because of his actions, he continued to love and serve God. When a person sincerely repents, God forgives any sin.
