REFLECTION QUESTIONS

- 1. Jacob rested in God's unusual blessing, even when it went against cultural norms. Reflect on a time when God worked in your life in an unexpected way. How did this experience shape your faith? How can we cultivate trust in God's sovereign plan, even when it doesn't align with our expectations? (Consider Isaiah 55:8-9 and Proverbs 3:5-6)
- 2. The sermon highlights God's choice of Judah despite his past sins. How does this example of grace challenge your view of God's forgiveness and redemption? In what ways can you extend this radical grace to others in your life who have fallen short? (Reflect on Ephesians 2:4-5 and Colossians 3:13)
- 3. Jacob approached death with confidence, declaring God's unusual will. How does the assurance of God's promises impact your view of mortality? What spiritual practices can we develop to strengthen our faith in the face of life's ultimate questions? (Consider 1 Corinthians 15:54-57 and 2 Corinthians 5:6-8)
- 4. The sermon presents Jesus as the ultimate fulfillment of Jacob's prophecy about Judah as warrior, ruler, vine, and wine-washer. Which of these aspects of Christ's identity resonates most deeply with your current spiritual journey, and why? How might meditating on these images deepen your relationship with Jesus? (Explore Revelation 5:5, Matthew 28:18, John 15:5, and Revelation 19:13-15)

What to do right after the service to help "the Word dwell more richly," within us (Colossians 3:16):

Don't let biblical teaching be a one-time event that fades from memory as soon as it is over (James 1:22-25). Choose one or two particular applications to share.
