What to do right after the service to help "the Word dwell more richly," within us (Colossians 3:16):

- 1. Instead of rushing off after the service is over, or talking about the latest news, develop the habit of talking about the sermon with people after church. Start spiritual conversations by asking, "How did the Scripture challenge or speak to you today?" Or "what about God in the message encouraged you?"
- 2. Encourage someone by sharing things you learned about God from His Word during the sermon. Make note of how your thinking has changed. Don't let biblical teaching be a one-time event that fades from memory as soon as it is over (James 1:22-25). Choose one or two particular applications to share.

MIDWEEK DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. The sermon highlights how Judah's decisions to associate with the wrong people and adopt
their values led him down a path of sinful choices. In what areas of your life do you need to be
more intentional about the company you keep and the influences you allow? What practical steps
can you take to surround yourself with people who will challenge you spiritually and keep you
accountable?

- 2. Judah seemed to lack principles and fear of God, giving in to temporary desires over eternal priorities. When are you most tempted to pursue fleeting pleasures at the expense of your faith? What battles do you face in keeping an eternal perspective? How can you build habits and support systems to resist those temptations?
- 3. The sermon notes that God's purposes prevailed despite the messiness and failures of the human characters involved. When have you seen God's grace and sovereignty overcome your own mistakes or shortcomings? How does remembering times like those build your trust in God during difficult circumstances?
- 4. Ultimately, the story points to how God works through imperfect people to accomplish His redemptive plan, culminating in Jesus Christ. How does this narrative encourage you that God can use your life for His purposes, despite your flaws and failures? What is one way you can cooperate with God's work in your life this week?
