


Transfiguratio + January 21, 2024 + 9:00 A.M.

Welcome to the Lord's Day. "He was bright as the lightning on the mountain and became more luminous than the sun, initiating us into the mystery of the future" (Gregory of Nazianzus, 329-390 A.D.). So an ancient preacher described the transfiguration that we celebrate today, in which Jesus reveals more than the glory of God: He shows the future glory of mankind, when all who believe in Him are resurrected in the flesh to inherit a new creation. With this vision in mind, we prepare for the celebration of His suffering and death in the coming season of Lent.



A Welcome for Those With Young Children

This house is your children's home, too. Relax and enjoy your time here:

- Jesus knows that children tend to wiggle and squawk, so please don't feel embarrassed by it. Your children are welcome at Zion.


*In the Gos*pels, the transfiguration story is introduced with the apparently innocent words, "after six days" (in Matthew and Mark), or "after about eight days" (in Luke). From early times, commentators have said that this is an al*lusion* to the days of creation: the transfiguration is the *climax of the* creative work of God, either the entrance *into the joy* and repose of the seventh day or the beginning of the new creation, the eighth day . . . thing more sure, the prophetic word, to which you will do well to pay attention as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts, ²⁰knowing this first of all, that no prophecy of Scripture comes from someone's own interpretation. ²¹For no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.





The Sanctus opens with the seraphims' dramatic acclamation of the divine majesty from Isaiah 6: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord" and sets the stage as we prepare to stand in the presence of the almighty and eternal God who deigns to come to us in Holy Communion . . .




