


Psalms of Lament

One Word	Word Key Component and Definition			
	Direct Address with Introductory Petition Turning to God in midst of trouble, brief introductory cry for help.	Psalm 13:1a		
	Lament/Complaint Description of the situation, commonly contains 3 elements: suffering of psalmist, absence of God, too-powerful enemy.	Psalm 13:1b-2 Psalm 69:2-4		
	Petition Heart of the complaint, plea for deliverance of some type, grounded in God's nature/character. Seeking to move God to act.	Psalm 13:3-4		
	Confidence The psalmist asserting his confidence in God despite the desperation and the present circumstances. Because of Who God is and what He has done in the past, he will act again.	Psalm 13:5		
	Conclusion/Praise Praise or a vow to praise, what the psalmist will say or do after his prayer is answered. May also contain a final complaint.	Psalm 13:6
