

Exodus 12:33-51 “The Final Warning of God”

September 20, 2026 - Cornerstone Church Bible Study Small Group Questions

Exodus 12:33-51 (NASB 95)

³³ The Egyptians urged the people, to send them out of the land in haste, for they said, “We will all be dead.” ³⁴ So the people took their dough before it was leavened, *with* their kneading bowls bound up in the clothes on their shoulders. ³⁵ Now the sons of Israel had done according to the word of Moses, for they had requested from the Egyptians articles of silver and articles of gold, and clothing; ³⁶ and the LORD had given the people favor in the sight of the Egyptians, so that they let them have their request. Thus they plundered the Egyptians. ³⁷ Now the sons of Israel journeyed from Rameses to Succoth, about six hundred thousand men on foot, aside from children. ³⁸ A mixed multitude also went up with them, ^[a] along with flocks and herds, a very large number of livestock. ³⁹ They baked the dough which they had brought out of Egypt into cakes of unleavened bread. For it had not become leavened, since they were driven out of Egypt and could not delay, nor had they ^[b] prepared any provisions for themselves.

1. Read through all of Exodus 12:33-51. How does God’s deliverance of Israel from their slavery in Egypt point to the Christian life? Read also 1 Corinthians 10:1-2, 11 to see how Paul sees this connection. What does it mean that Israel was a “type.”
2. What does slavery to sin look like today? How have you seen slavery to sin manifest in your past or in the world today?
3. What is the way that we are freed from slavery to sin? Read John 8:31-36, how does Jesus set us free?
4. Why is it necessary to seek freedom in haste rather than lingering in sin?
5. Why does our slavery to sin require a complete work? What are some implications of the complete work of being born again? How have you seen this in your own life or the lives of others? Are there sins in your own life that you are holding on to and need to repent of, that you are willing to share?
6. How is it significant that none of Jesus’ bones were broken on the cross (see John 19:33, 36). Why is Jesus’ fulfillment of the Passover good news for you?

Spend some time praying for each other’s struggles and then some time praising God for His goodness and for the Lord Jesus Christ the promised King who came, lived, died on the cross for forgiveness of our sins. Jesus Christ rose again and ascended to heaven where he sits on the throne and from where He will return and come again to judge the living and the dead. Who will by His power restore all creation, to the glory of God the Father. He lives to intercede for His own and saves to the uttermost as Hebrews puts it. Pray for more Spirit-wrought faithfulness and boldness to proclaim the good news of God’s grace and mercy in Jesus Christ and for more faithful gospel preaching churches

unashamed of the gospel of Christ to rise up. Pray the Lord of the Harvest would raise up many workers (Matthew 9:38) to take the Gospel to the nations and call sinners to repent of their sin and look to Jesus Christ for salvation, eternal life and lasting hope.
